**How you can help at home:**

- Practise name writing with your child (capital letter for first letter only).
- Help your child to recognise their own name at home.
- Please read to your child as much as possible. Talk about the front cover first; what do the children think the story might be about? Then talk about the pictures before you read the words. What can you see? What do they think might happen next?
- Play games with sounds! Can your child tell you the first sound they can hear in words? For example 's' for socks.
